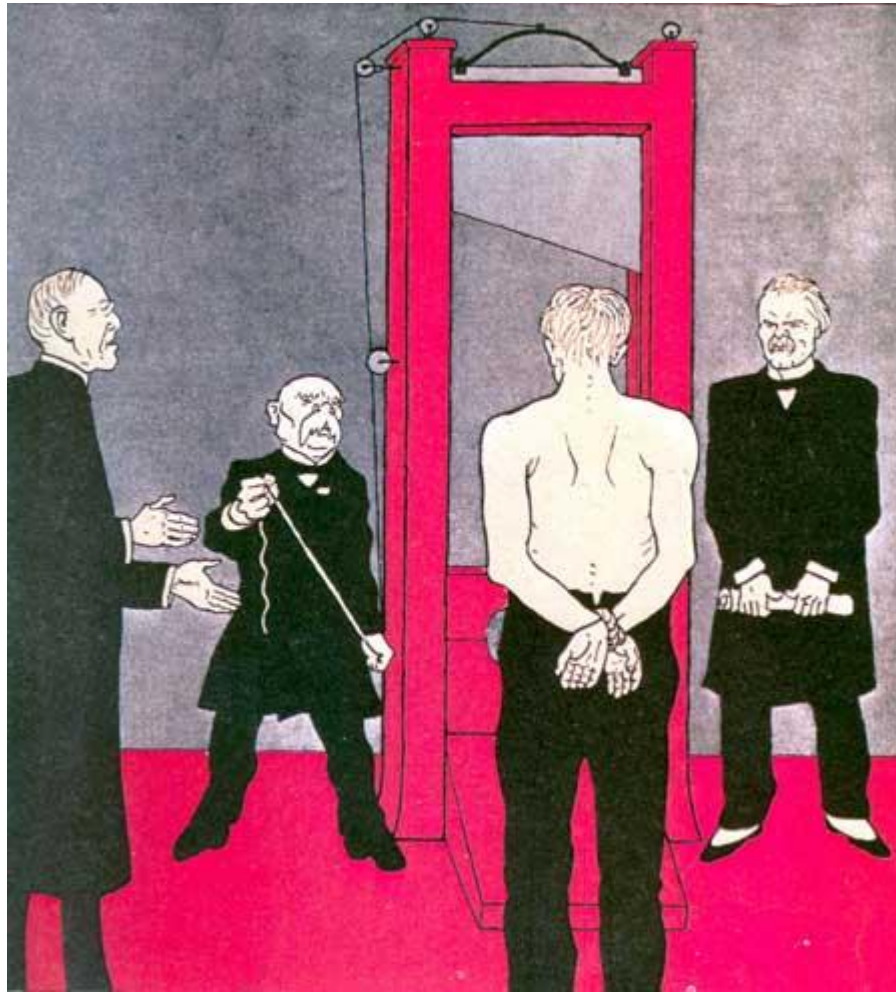
For Years 8/9 this week, we have started with a new topic which is LITERATURE. We started with reading a short story book that will help students in developing vocabulary and being able to do analysis in literary work. We read the story of "PANYA DURO ALBINO" for the advanced level students and the story of "ZUZU NA WEZI WATATU" for those of beginner and intermediate students.

Generally each student was able to read and identify the characters in the story he read as well as explore the language used by writing difficult and new words to them. Good job, everyone!



History with Mr. Ben

In Y9 Humanities, after developing their skills throughout the year, students have now been given a taste of what to expect next year when they progress into Year 10 and begin IGCSE History. In a very heated negotiation, students in pairs representing Lloyd-George of the UK, Clemenceau of France, and Wilson of the USA, drafted their own Treaty of Versailles. They aimed to balance achieving a lasting peace with getting the best possible deal for their own countries. We then discussed whether the course of history would have changed had our own Treaty of Versailles been adopted in 1919. Would our making the Rhineland an independent state have prevented the rise of Hitler? (Probably not!) We then began to analyse some political cartoons satirising the Treaty of Versailles, developing our skills of source analysis.



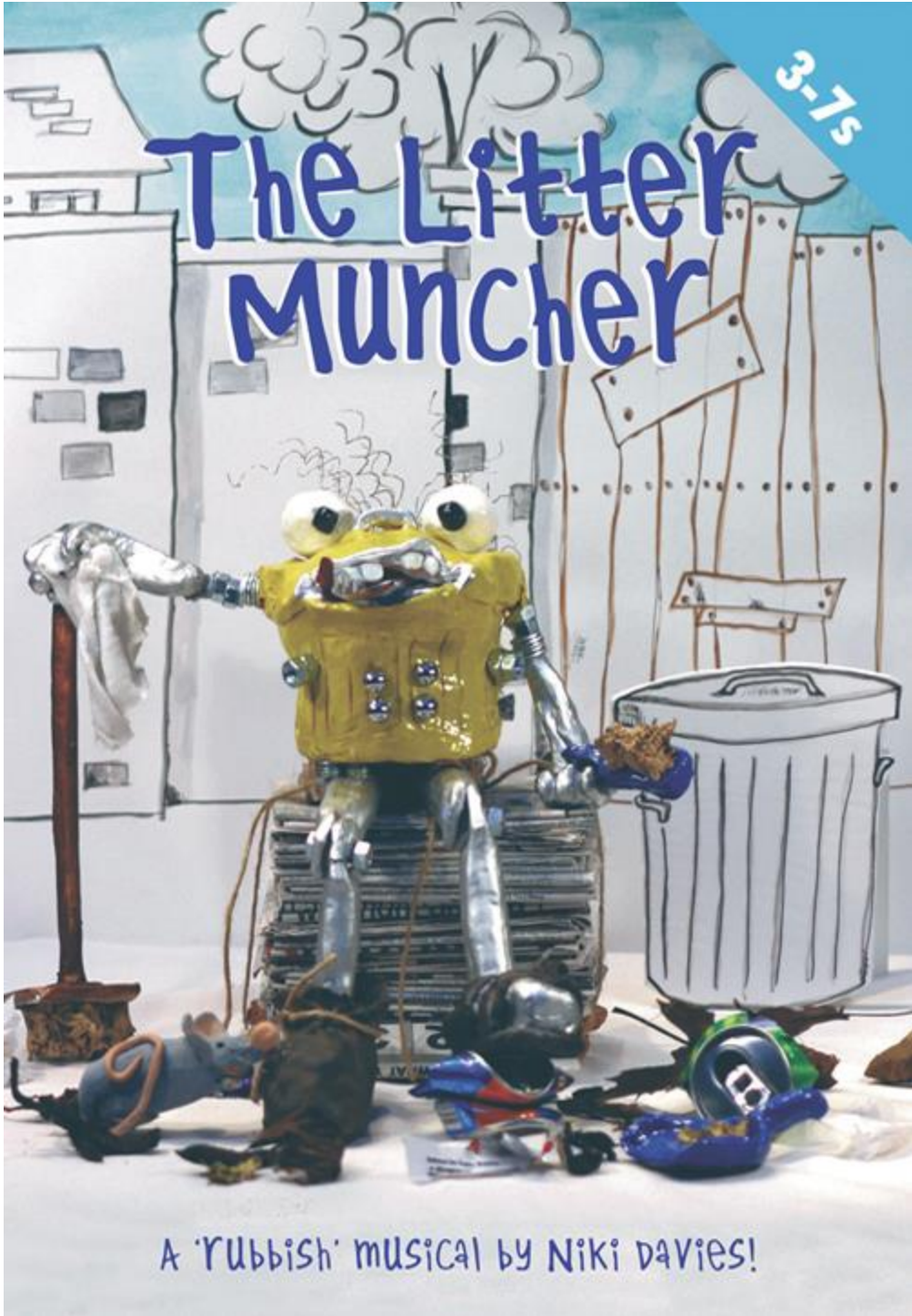
PE with Mr. Juma
